Best Kept Secret is a BOCES Adult Education Opportunity

Oswego County BOCES offers adults in Oswego County and surrounding areas a training site for career opportunities, but training is just the tip of the iceberg of what the Adult Education and Workforce Development Office can provide. Whether you are a displaced worker, an individual looking for career advancement or employment training, or an adult who wants to earn their GED, Oswego County BOCES can help you achieve that goal.

Many adult education programs are offered at little or no cost to students. These include free literacy assessments, GED classes, and career inventory assessments to help adults who are unsure of their career path. Oswego County BOCES will also begin offering free English as a Second Language (ESL) Literacy courses in January 2007, and they welcome referrals through county agencies or assistance programs.

Donna Donabella, recently named the Director of Adult Education and Workforce Development, implemented changes within the office to increase its efficiency and better suit the needs of students. "We've consolidated the office to house all staff in one location, and implemented procedures to insure that all areas [of adult education] are on the same page," she said. This restructuring makes it easier for students to obtain information on any program offered by the department, almost like one-stop shopping.



Starting in December, Oswego County BOCES will host Adult Education Information Sessions, the first to be held on December 12th from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. and on December 14th from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m. After the first month, the information sessions will be hosted on the second Tuesday of each month from 9:30 to 10:30 a.m. and the fourth Thursday of each month from 6:00 to 7:00 p.m. These sessions will include all program information including literacy, health occupations, adult and evening CTE courses, financial aid information and career interest inventory. Any interested adult is welcome to attend the session. No registration is required.

"It's part of our open-door policy," said Donabella. "If you're interested in courses, or just curious about what our program offerings are, stop in on one of those dates and we will be happy to answer your questions."

Courses run continuously and many Health Occupation offerings and Career and Technical Education classes will be available for enrollment in the spring. For more information about program offerings or information sessions, contact the Adult Education office at 963-4256.

What is Labor Market Information (LMI)?

The New York State Department of Labor defines labor market information as all the facts that help to bring about a match between employers looking for workers and workers looking for jobs. The items listed below are a few examples of LMI and how it can help bring workers and jobs together:

- Information about new and expanding businesses
- Help-wanted ads and online job listings
- Information about graduates of specific education or training programs
- Resumes and resume banks

- Information about wages offered by employers for specific occupations

Taking the Stress Out of Change



The work world changes rapidly and it's up to you to adjust. Of course change is stressful, but

it needn't get the best of you. Try these strategies to help you cope with a changing work environment:

◆ **Write down the pros and cons of an impending change.** Much of what gets us worrying about change is not knowing what the change will mean. If you sit down and figure out the ramifications of the changes,

you'll be able to eliminate the fear of the unknown. List the downsides to the changes and list the potential upsides. Don't just assume the worst without looking at the positives the change has to offer.

◆ **Do your homework.** Arm yourself with information about the people you'll be working with.

◆ **Network. Network.** **Network.** When you find that your team is being restructured, don't wait for others to invite you to introduce yourself. Be

proactive and get to know as many of the new workers as you can. You may get a better understanding of new opportunities or expectations. Taking the initiative lets others know you're willing to adjust.

◆ **Contribute right away.** The best way to show that you're capable and flexible is to get started on projects on which you can work. Keep managers up to date on your involvement in plans or projects.


Funding Opportunities
